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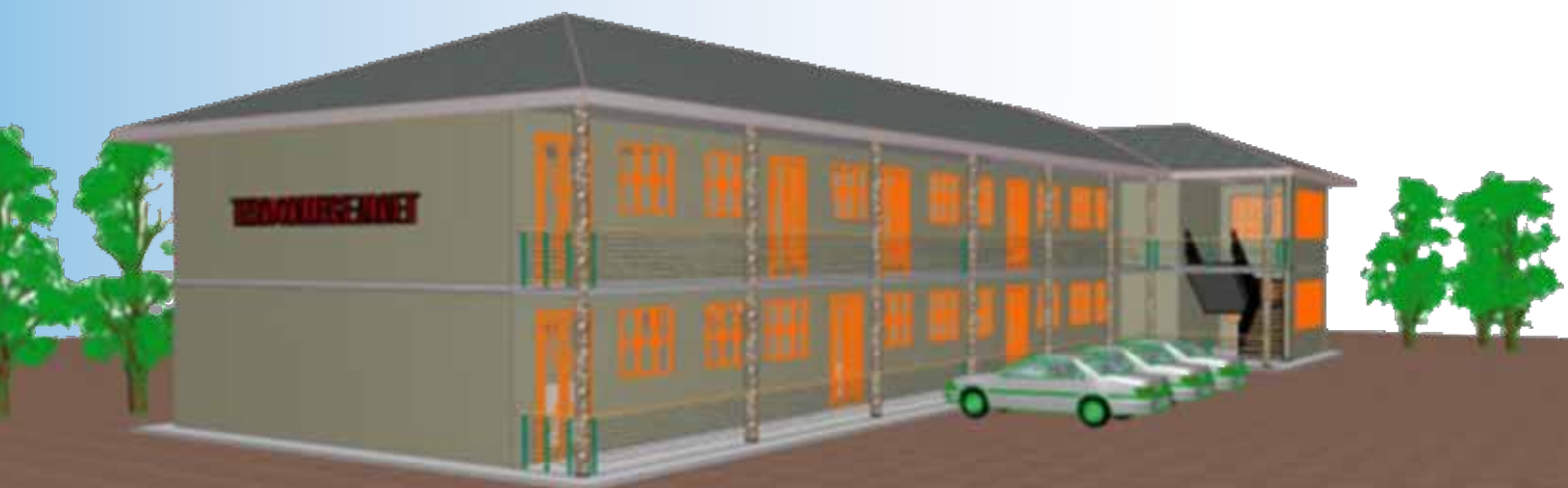

Spiritual Needs



Dear Reader,
I am filled with joy to share with you what pertains spiritual life for the students of Teso College Aloet. Whereas the main reason for our being here is to engage in intellectual and Academic endeavours, it is suffice to say that without spiritual nourishment we shall be lacking or devoid of one crucial area in our lives- the spiritual aspect.

It is true that a human being has physical, mental and spiritual needs. To cater for spiritual needs of students we enjoy the privilege of having two Chaplains in our school: Rev. Joseph Aupal serves the Protestants and Rev. Fr. Apuri Moses attends to the spiritual needs of the Catholics.

Pastoral- Spritial Programmes:

As it were, there seems to be a very close relationship between the body and spirit.

This is reflected by the fact that sometimes one can feel he is sick but when medical tests are carried out they all reveal he is physically okay and this kind of sickness is called psychosomatic (psychological sickness). It is in the same line of argument that Jesus cures someone from a physical ailment and says your sins are forgiven. In this regard therefore we carry out the following for the students in out care:

□ PRAYER LIFE

We duly have the celebration of the Eucharist at 5:00P.M everyday from Monday to Friday. During the months of the Rosary (May and October) we encourage the Recitation of the Rosary. On Sundays however we celebrate the first mass from 7:00a.m to 8:30a.m for the student community and 2nd mass 8:30 - 10:00a.m for the outside Christians.

□ SACRAMENTAL LIFE

Besides receiving Holy Communion for those who are disposed, we also have the opportunity to receive the sacrament of reconciliation every Saturday at 5:00p.m - 5:45p.m. Both the Protestant and Catholic community of students annually are provided with a chance to get confirmation by their respective Bishops.

□ FAMILY DAY

- There is an annual day to coming together as one family embracing people of different affiliations. On this day, in October, we usually pray for the school Administration, Teachers, Parents, Workers and Students. Bishops are the chief guests and other religious leaders i.e Catholics and Protestants.



▫ CELEBRATING SOLEMNITIES:

There is usually every year an opportunity to celebrate the solemnities Viz: Christ's Solemn entry into Jerusalem (Palm Sunday),

The Institution of the Eucharist (Holy Thursday) . The Passion, way of the Cross, The Easter Vigil and Easter Feast. In these celebrations, the students have participated, actively, fully and consciously.

▫ MOVEMENT AND ASSOCIATIONS:

The Red Cross and YCS are the Christian Associations that are geared towards making a student world a better place to live in. Their small initiatives of charity leave a mark of difference. They usually have participated in charitable activities like cleaning up the Health Centre. They also carry out duties in the church like cleaning the chapel premises, taking readings in church, participating in the choir and practical exercise of leadership.

▫ ALUMNI -

We commend the Alumni of TCA who have come back home to give returns to what made them be who they are;profound thanks. We are in a special way indebted to all of you led by your President, Dr. Geoffrey Akileng. We look forward to that day when you will grace our community in July 2015 and in which prayers will be held.

▫ In conclusion, I would like to appreciate the Head teacher and Co-operation of the staff in regard to spiritual activities in the school . I should not forget to thank Government for ensuring what the constitution provides for freedom of worship. The response of the students to spiritual activities is commendable.

Articles by the Alumni

Article 1



A BRIEF HISTORY

Enoch Epaku was born in 1882 to the family of Mr. Osele and Miss Aoja who hailed from Akulume Aukot Asuret sub county, Soroti District.

He belonged to the clan of Ikaugwok-ibelakojo, who are spread to many places in Teso, namely Aloet-Arapai-Soroti, Katine Soroti, Kudetij-Serere and Kongonyo- Bugondo and he finally built his home in Aloet-Arapai-Soroti District.

EDUCATION

Enoch Epaku was one of the lucky Etesot who received education through the support of the first missionaries, where he had his primary and junior education in Asuret and Soroti in Soroti district. After his education he was appointed as an interpreter by the Colonial Government. After sometime, Semei Kakungulu, the then colonial agent promoted Enoch Epaku to sub-county Chief and then later a county Chief to administer the whole of Teso, totalling to eight counties. The Colonial Government gave him the task of marking boundaries of Teso, lango, Karamoja, Bugisu and Sebei; and to supervise the opening of the old Mbale –Soroti route which later was upgraded to current Mbale –Soroti road.

DEVELOPMENT

Enoch Epaku influenced the East African Railways and Houghbours line to pass through Teso so that the railway transport benefits the people of Teso in 1928.

He gave land for the construction of a Technical school which later was upgraded to Teso College Aloet (both East and West wings)

He marked permanent boundaries in Teso, Lango, Karamoja, Bugisu and Sebei which are recognized up to date.
Gave land for the construction of the Training camp for the Second World War soldiers, where Aloet primary school is currently located.

About 1930th Enock Epaku constructed a very large Pump-Water Source to enable the community and animals access clean water by then in Aloet-Arapai, Soroti District

FAMILY STATUS

Enock Epaku was married to five women, traditionally recognized and others came in as gifts from other counties, so they became ten in total. He had fourteen children; seven sons and seven daughters all living in Aloet Village, Arapai Sub-county, soroti County, Soroti District, Uganda; where he died and was buried in 1935.

Dr. John Ekure



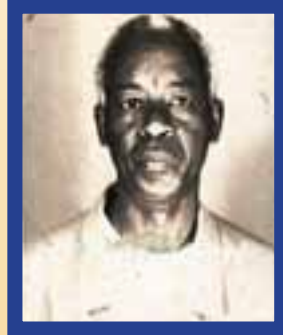
Dr. John Ekure was born in Serere District. He studied in Teso College Aloet between 1985 and 1988. He was one of the best performers in his class. After TCA, he joined St Peters College Tororo and finally Makerere University where he obtained Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery degrees. He later pursued a Master of Medicine in Orthopaedic Surgery. Dr Ekure is household name in the field of Orthopaedic surgery.

He worked in Kumi and Soroti Hospitals for a long time. He is currently the Executive Director of Kumi Orthopaedic Hospital, one of the first hospitals of its kind in Uganda. Currently the hospital receives patients from the Eastern region of Uganda, Nationally and from other countries in East African region and the South Sudan. John is also a prolific researcher in area of orthopaedic medicine.

He was a winner of the prestigious Braimbridge Award for scientific research on Gluteal fibrosis ASEA in 2006. He also received in 2014 the best Investor in the Health sector for specialised service3s in the rural health sector, in Ministry of Health Uganda.

Dr Ekure is philanthropist who has generously contributed to the cause of the less privileged in society especially in Teso. He is the immediate past president of Lions Club Kumi. He has contributed generously to the projects of the alumni of TCA.

JOHN GERMANI AS DEPUTY H/M [1977 - 1979]



I graduated from Makerere University in 1972 and was posted to Busoga college Mwiri and by 1974 I was a deputy H/M there; thereafter I was transferred to Nabumali H/S (1975-1977) then to Teso College-Aloet (1977-1979).

As deputy headmaster, under H/M Steven Besweri Akabway I was mainly in charge of general administration of over 900 boys. Three years later my wife Justine Germani and I had two daughters, Racheal and Norah.

My first Teso college days were very enjoyable had it not been for the 1979 liberation war to remove Amin. To be honest the war period caught us right in the middle because we escaped death three times and had all our house properties looted-luckily our lives were spared! Thank God for this.

My family of seven were hidden for six weeks by a dear friend called Olupot (R.I.P) of Adachari-Asuret. This proves that the Iteso people are kind and humane! May God bless you my Teso brothers and sisters.

To prove this point one month after I was transferred to Kyebambe Girls senior secondary school, in 1980,

the management of Teso College organised a very good farewell party for me and gave me a return air ticket from Kasese to Soroti!

So I still hold fond memories of Teso College and my Iteso brothers and sisters especially of my boss Besweri Akabway whose honesty and integrity is close to a saint!

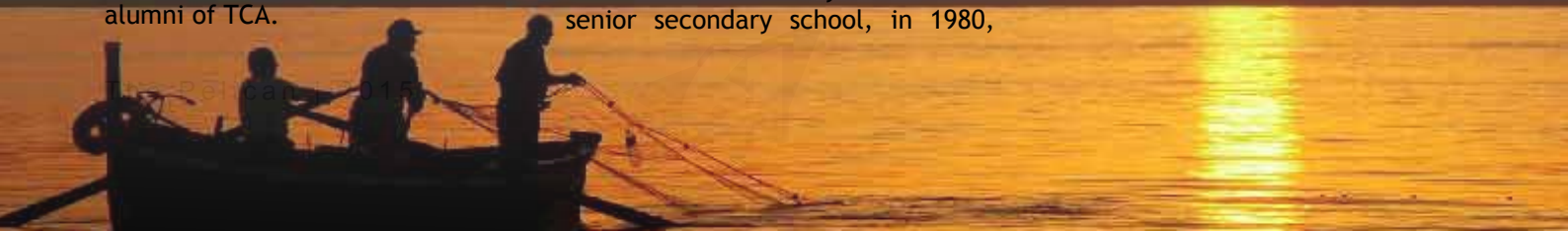
From Teso College I was moved to Kyebambe Girls Secondary school 1980-1982, Nyakasura school 1982-1983 as D H/M, then to Rusekere Secondary School as H/M 1984-1994. Now I am retired though not tired.

Dr. Omonuk has contributed immensely to the development of accounting in Uganda and beyond. To mention just one of his scholarly activities, Dr. Omonuk authored a book in accounting that became a cherished instructional text for universities within and beyond Uganda. Dr. Omonuk has taught and mentored many students and colleagues some of whom currently occupy high offices in both public and private sectors in Uganda and internationally.

Dr. Omonuk received best Lecturer awards at Makerere University Business School and American University of Nigeria. He also received recognition for exemplary service to the Makerere University senate. Dr. Omonuk has served as a World Bank consultant in financial management and accountability/accounting. Dr. Omonuk upholds a very high level of professionalism in all undertakings.

Dr. Omonuk is a philanthropist who has generously contributed to the cause of the less-privileged in society and community development efforts including building of churches and schools. He has also generously contributed to the project that alumni are currently undertaking at Teso College Aloet.

2012. Basing on his vast experience and expertise, he was selected chairperson of this Board in 2012, a position he still holds to date.

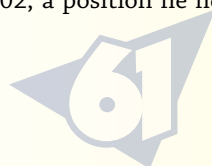

Silvester Ocaatum, disclosed that in S.6 188 students are taking sciences while 34 Arts and those in S.5 200 students are doing sciences while 24 Arts While inspecting the school they were led by the old prefect Col William Omaria, among others before joined by the Stephen Besweri Akabwai, the former Head Teacher of the school in 1976-1979.

The old students also agreed to see how the woodwork workshop can be rehabilitated and equipped.

During the meeting the Head teachers of the school, Sylvester Ocaatum, highlighted more areas of concern and cited lack of adequate teachers houses some dormitories that were at the sorry state, a need of library in west wing and challenge of rebuilding Epaku house.

“Teachers houses are not enough only 45 which some of them have dilapidated doors, the school pays a rent of 25 teachers in Town and transporting them every day. Area that deserves immediate attention” Ocaatum said.

Stephen Besweri Akabwai, urged student to dedicate themselves in pursuing science subjects. “Read, and read so that in future you will become the engineers, doctors, accountants. I am what am now for the good results I got in Teso college,” Omaria said.

Omaria pledged sh2m, deputy head of procurement parliament, Herbert Ariko shs4m, Minister Ecweru and Hon Elaijah Okupa, each pledged sh5m, Dr John Ekure, Proprietor of Kumi Orthopedic hospital also pledged iron sheets worth sh3m among others.

As part of the activities to mark the celebrations, a school alumni association was launched, its executive committee elected and subsequently sworn in. In the elections presided over by Serere Woman MP Alice Alaso Asianut, Dr.

Godfrey Akileng, a senior lecturer in accounting and finance at Makerere University Business School was elected as a President of Teso College Alumni association for the next two years.

Andrew Epenyu was elected the vice chairperson, Dr. Julius Otim-secretary while Stephen Areke is the treasurer. Others include Prof. Pius Okong, the young alumni adviser and former Electoral Commission Interim Chairperson, Stephen Besweri Akabwai also old boy and former head teacher of the school who was appointed patron. “We are sorry for what happened but we are happy you are alive. You shouldn’t get demoralized. Storms are very violent and not only Teso is affected the rains are a challenge country wide,” Ecweru told the students.

The minister disclosed that within two weeks’ time, about 100 schools country wide had been de roofed by heavy storms. He encouraged students to maintain discipline and excel in academics for their future success.

Accompanied by some members of the school’s alumni executive committee

and school administrators led by the head teacher, Sylvester Ocaatum, Ecweru inspected the damaged administration block, dormitories and staff houses some of which were temporarily being reroofed.

During his visit several students appealed for immediate attention saying their books, mattresses, clothes had got soaked in water.

The situation had compelled some of the students to share beds and mattresses with their roommates,” Simon Okello said.

Some of the students had to be relocated to sleep in the dining hall and classrooms. Sylvester Ocaatum said seven teachers’

houses, five dormitories, were de-roofed, one pit latrine collapsed, one student slightly injured and two electricity poles and wiring systems got damaged.

Government had to act. The quick promise to deliver 500 pieces of iron sheets to Teso College Aloet was timely. Thanks to Honourable Ecweru and the intervention by the Alumni.

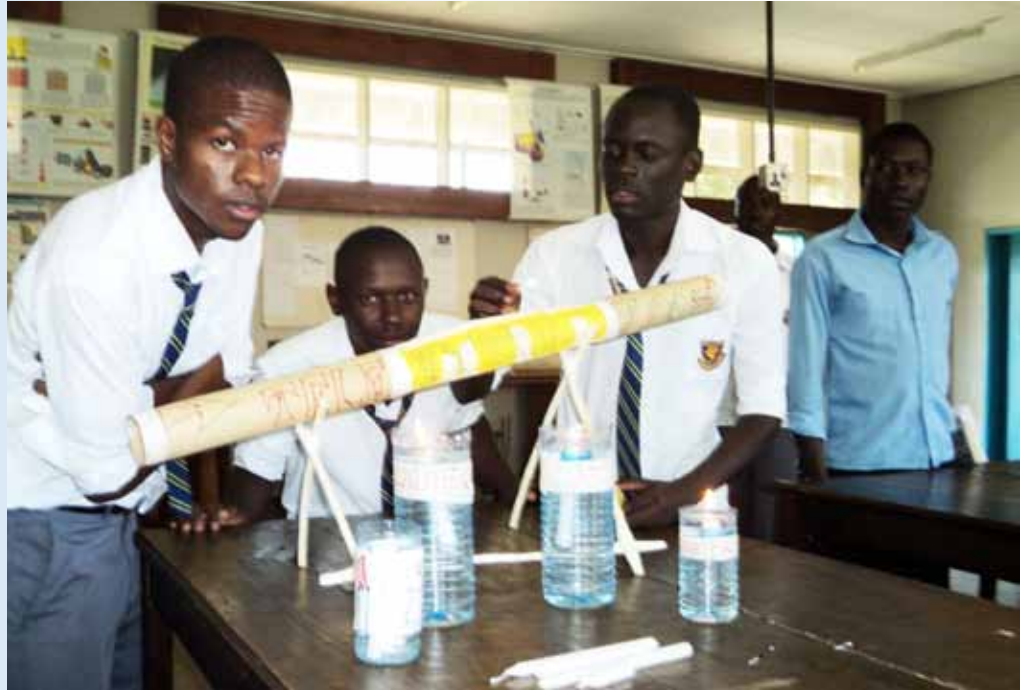
The object is made to face the image then the eye is directed through the eye piece side. The erecting lens is used for zooming or diminishing respectively.

Dr. Pius Okong
M.B.Ch.B., Dip Obs, M.Med (MU), PhD (KI)

His Lordship Justice (Emeritus) Steven George Engwau Joined the school in 1957-1960 where he did his Cambridge School certificate. He was in Middle House. Some of his contemporaries are Ephraim Okalebo, Stephen Besweri Akabway and Col. (Rtd) William Omaria L' Arapai.

Judge Engwau is a Barrister at Law of the Middle Temple Inn in the United Kingdom. He served as High Court between 1978-1979, then 1990-1997 when he was promoted to the Court of Appeal /Constitutional Court as a Justice of Appeal a position he held until his retirement in 2011. He is now a Consultant/Arbitrator with a Kampala law firm M/s Engoru, Mutebi Advocates.

Dr. Okong was in Teso College Aloet 1973/74 for A level, House Captain for Kenyatta, joined Makerere University 1975 and graduated as Medical Doctor 1980. Masters degree 1983/86 and carried out Pioneer research on human papilloma virus in Uganda showing its association with cancer of the cervix, and subsequent research linking to vaccine development for this, commonest cancer in women. Doctoral studies on maternal health and awarded a PhD in Karolinska Institutet, Sweden (2004). An Obstetrician and Gynaecologist; worked in Mulago NRH and Nsambya Hospital; retired civil servant after serving for 32 years. Served as President of the Association of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists of Uganda; and in different capacities internationally with FIGO, WHO, PMNCH and distinguished recognition by Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Nov, 2010. Associate Professor (STM, UCU 2008) and Honorary Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (UMU 2011). Chairperson Health Service Commission (March 2012-March 2016).

Henry G. R. Kerali
BSc (Eng.), MSc, PhD, MIHT, FICE, CEng.

Henry Kerali joined Teso College Aloet in 1970 after completing primary school in Moroto Town Council School. He was elected Head Prefect in 1974 and completed Senior 6 in 1975 gaining AAB principles in Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry (a rare fit in the 1960s/70s). He studied Civil Engineering at Makerere University, graduating in 1980 with an Upper Second honours degree, was immediately appointed Teaching Assistant and was subsequently awarded a Commonwealth Scholarship in 1981.

He went to study at the University of Birmingham (UK), obtained a Master's degree in 1982, and a PhD in 1986. He was appointed a Research Fellow and then Lecturer at the University of Birmingham, where he later became a full Professor in 2000. While in the UK, he also became a Fellow of the Institution of Civil Engineers (FICE) and a Chartered Engineer (CEng.) Professor Kerali joined the World Bank in 2003 as a Senior Transport Engineer and was appointed Sector Manager for Transport in 2009. He was then promoted to Regional Director for the South Caucasus in 2012. From July 2015, Henry Kerali took up the position of World Bank Regional Director for West Africa, based in Accra, Ghana.

MB ChB, MPH, DPH, PGDM, PhD

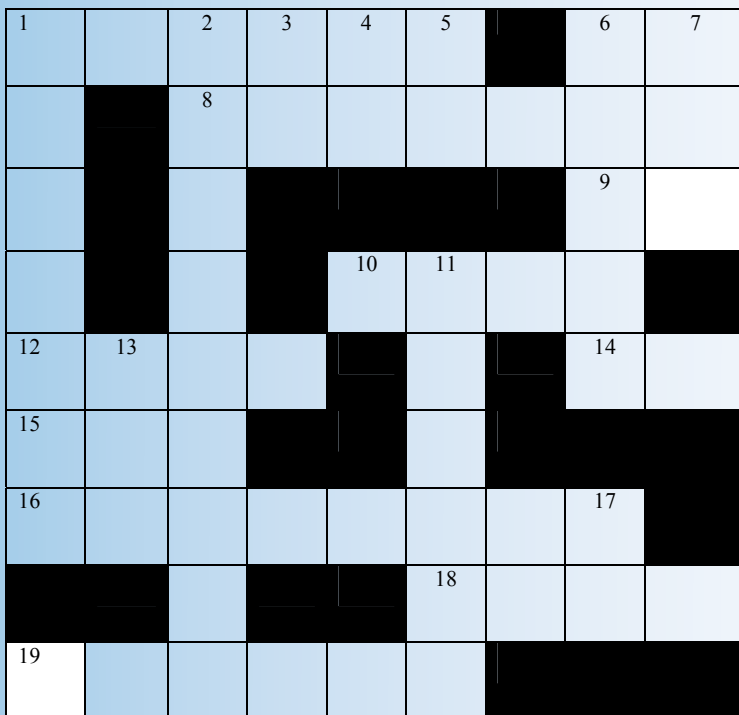
